Combing the ocean depths

In 2016 an international team, including the University of Southampton's Centre for Maritime Archaeology, launched an expedition mapping submerged ancient landscapes in the Black Sea.

The team is surveying the Bulgarian waters of the Black Sea, where thousands of years ago large areas of land were inundated as the water level rose following the last Ice Age.

During these surveys the team also discovered and inspected a rare and remarkable 'collection' of more than 40 shipwrecks, many of which provide the first views of ship types known from historical sources, but never seen before. The wrecks include ships from the Ottoman and Byzantine Empires as well as the world's oldest intact shipwreck, hailing from ancient Greece. They provide new data on the maritime interconnectivity of Black Sea coastal communities and manifest ways of life and seafaring that stretch back into prehistory.

MSc Archaeology

Programme Director: Professor Jo Sofaer

This programme is a pathways-based research degree, with a strong emphasis on the development of skills and specialisms in Higher Archaeological Practice, Palaeoanthropology or Bioarchaeology. You may choose to focus on one of these areas, or alternatively you may prefer to acquire a broad range of skills across these specialisms, including from other programmes, such as maritime archaeology.

MSc Archaeology (Higher Archaeological Practise)

This pathway has strong vocational content, that is designed to develop skills in the management and implementation of archaeological projects. It is intended for those preparing for a career in commercial archaeology or as continuing professional development.

Students will learn about the structure and organisation of archaeological practice within the UK, how to design and manage archaeological projects, and how to write and prepare reports.

MSc Archaeology (Palaeoanthropology)

Palaeoanthropology is a pathway within the MSc degree, and it aims to give you a diverse and in-depth experience of the discipline's key themes. There is a strong emphasis on the development of practical skills in the study of ancient material culture, in visiting some key Palaeolithic sites, and in reconstructing the environments and lifeways of our hominin ancestors.

MSc Archaeology (Bioarchaeology)

This pathway has a strong emphasis on the development of skills and specialism in Bioarcheology, including opportunities to gain experience with both human and zooarchaeological remains.

Students have unlimited access to a large human skeletal collection, including Bronze Age, Roman, Anglo-Saxon, and medieval skeletons, as well as one of the largest faunal comparative collections in the UK, including fish and birds.

MSc Business and Heritage Management

Programme Director: Professor Alistair Pike

The heritage industry is a major and growing contributor to the global economy, employing increased numbers of skilled heritage managers. This degree offers a tailor made curriculum to develop the knowledge base and skills required from both the disciplines of Business and Archaeology to allow effective management of the world's heritage. As a student on this programme you will be guided through modules to develop your understanding of the economic and legal principals within which heritage management operates across the globe, from Museum displays to site presentations and how heritage shapes national identities.

MA/MSc Maritime Archaeology

Programme Director: Dr Julian Whitewright

Investigation of our maritime past has gathered rapid momentum in recent years, becoming a dynamic and focused field that is integral to the discipline of archaeology. As well as investigating submerged landscapes, settlements and shipwrecks, the whole 'coastal zone' is now acknowledged as a priority in terms of protection, management and research. This degree will provide you with theoretical and practical expertise required of maritime archaeology in the 21st century.

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

The interdisciplinary nature of archaeology underpins our understanding of past societies, guided by new theoretical frameworks and investigative methods. We believe in the contemporary relevance of archaeology, and have a strong tradition of investigating the politics of the past and its representation in literature and other media.

The programme is also available as a distance learning programme, which is designed for people who wish to study without travelling to Southampton.

We offer supervision for research in a wide range of areas, from the Palaeolithic to industrial archaeology, from the interpretation of material and culture to the politics of the past. You will have the opportunity to participate in a lively research community.

Changing the face of finance

'Show Me the Money! The Image of Finance, 1700 to the Present' is a major collaborative project between staff at the Universities of Manchester, Southampton and Edinburgh and the Northern Gallery for Contemporary Art in Sunderland, exploring the history and representation of finance, exploring how often elusive but familiar concepts - like the market, credit and debt, or even money itself – are given meaning and form through visual and literary culture. The research culminated in a national touring exhibition, charting how the financial world has been imagined in art, illustration, and photography from the South Sea Bubble of the early eighteenth century to the global financial crisis of 2008.

The research tour included two University of Southampton sites: the Chawton House Library, where it revealed new research exploring Jane Austen's own brush with financial crisis, and the John Hansard Gallery, where students were able to participate in the events organised around the exhibition.

MA Jane Austen

Programme Director: Kim Simpson

Our new MA in Jane Austen is an interdisciplinary programme for the study of Jane Austen's culture, work, reception, and the implications of her continuing and increasing popularity in the modern day. You will be taught by a team of specialists at the University of Southampton and have unique access to the archives at Chawton House, former home of Austen's brother, and now an internationally recognised research centre for the study of early women's writing. The programme combines academic and practical approaches, marrying the study of Jane Austen's historical and cultural context and a range of modern scholarly approaches to Austen with insights into the heritage industry and literary tourism.

MA Creative Writing

Programme Director: Carol Burns

Our lively programme focuses on the craft of fiction, scriptwriting, poetry and writing for children through weekly writing workshops and literature seminars which engage in a close study of contemporary writing. We encourage collaboration with other art forms, allowing students to tap into our on-campus theatre and concert hall, the prestigious Winchester School of Art, and the research taking place in English and other disciplines. Visiting writers and editors deepen student understanding of the publishing world. The programme culminates in a creative writing dissertation developed in consultation with a published writer.

MA English Literary Studies

Programme Director: Stephen Morton

This programme comprises a wide range of topics and approaches, enabling students to practise textual, cultural and theoretical modes of analysis important to advanced research in English and the humanities in general. The dissertation allows you to focus on a single topic.

MA English Literary Studies pathways

MA English Literary Studies (Eighteenth Century)

This pathway allows you to specialise in the history and culture of the long eighteenth century through interdisciplinary study encompassing literature, history, philosophy and visual and material culture. You will be introduced to concepts and issues central to current research, and will study the unique collection of early women's writing at Chawton House.

MA English Literary Studies (Nineteenth Century)

This pathway allows you to specialise in the history and culture of the long nineteenth century through interdisciplinary study encompassing literature, history, publishing and print culture, and visual and material culture. You will be introduced to concepts and issues central to current research in the period, and will participate in study visits to national archives and resources.

MA English Literary Studies (Twentieth Century and Contemporary)

This pathway explores the complex cultural histories of recent literatures in English, including modernist writing; contemporary writing; gender and sexuality; literature's relationship to other discourses (law, science, race); national, minority, dissident and diasporic writing; and postcolonial literatures. We offer advanced training in close textual study, history and theory.

MA English Literary Studies (Postcolonial and World Literature)

This pathway explores the emergence of postcolonial and world literatures in English, and the histories of empire and decolonisation underpinning these literatures. It considers how different postcolonial cultures have transformed genre and form; and how the global intersections of race, gender, sexuality, and diaspora have changed our ways of reading literature's worldliness.

MA Global Literary Industries Management

This course is designed for students preparing for careers in the literary and cultural industries, including journalism, publishing, creative writing, editing, archiving, reviewing, broadcasting, arts writing and heritage management.

You will be taught by academics with professional experience in publishing, journalism, editing, curating, archiving and documentary-making, heritage, and arts management. You will explore the most significant and innovative developments in these fields, including new media, online and interactive publishing, gaming and narrative, arts and site specific writing, adaptations and translations, literary tourism and heritage management.

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

We value both large projects and individual passions in research.

We offer PhD supervision in English, interdisciplinary studies (via the research centres) and creative writing. Our postgraduates are an essential part of the English and humanities research community at Southampton. You will receive regular supervision and training in research and communication skills. You will participate

in weekly research seminars and will be encouraged to contribute to conferences, at Southampton and elsewhere. We welcome informal enquiries and like to work with students to refine their research proposals before they submit their formal applications.

Calling the shots

'Calling the Shots: Women and Contemporary Film Culture in the UK, 2000-2015' was a four-year AHRC funded project that allowed Southampton Film researchers to investigate what is distinctive about the work of women in British cinema and what obstacles women face in the industry. The project, led by Dr Shelley Cobb and Professor Linda Ruth Williams (University of Exeter) and with partners including the British Film Institute, sought to undertake a detailed statistical analysis of British films from 2000-2015. This involved interviews with 59 women in six key filmmaking roles. The data collection produced annual reports for the years of 2000-2015 detailing how many women worked in key production roles on British films released between those years to help build a story of women's varied experiences in British film in the first part of this century.

MA Film Studies

Programme Director: Professor Kevin Donnelly

This programme offers students a high level of understanding of film studies as well as being the ideal preparation for doctoral research. It covers an in-depth discussion of the most influential theories and methodologies in the field and provides an introduction to the latest debates and concerns, including issues arising from cinema's textual properties and questions regarding the medium's wider social impact. We have excellent facilities and host a series of regular talks from external speakers, including industry professionals and internationally acclaimed film scholars.

MA Film and Cultural Management

Programme Director: Dr Ruby Cheung

This programme provides a framework through which the contemporary cultural sector, in particular the film industry, can be understood and analysed, focusing on how cultural management affects the visual media. Areas covered may include film festival studies, specialist film programming, film policy, film exhibition, marketing and audience development, and the role of private and public film agencies. Case studies draw on local, national and international examples.

IPhD

The IPhD (Integrated PhD) is a four year programme of study. In the first year you will follow taught courses in Film alongside our MA students and undertake a series of assessments (essays and presentations). If these are completed successfully, you will produce an extended research proposal during the summer. You will then be upgraded to PhD status towards the end of Year Three if your work is progressing satisfactorily. This is an ideal pathway for those new to Film Studies and/or international students as it provides a detailed and intensive taught introduction to Film Studies.

HISTORY

Our research interests range from the ancient world to contemporary global history, from East to West, across topics as diverse as the buildings of the Roman Empire, the clothing of the Tudor and Stuart courts and the roots of the United States' cyber security. But we have a common commitment to the creation of new knowledge, to communication of that knowledge to audiences beyond academe, and to placing the spirit of intellectual discovery at the heart of the education we provide to our students.

The price of Britain's 'sweet tooth'

Professor Christer Petley's current research focuses on British sugar-planters of the eighteenth century. These powerful slaveholders with properties in the Caribbean were extraordinarily wealthy, and they wielded considerable political influence for an extended period of time.

Professor Petley's research led to a collaboration with performance artist Elaine Mitchener, exploring Britain's historical involvement with Caribbean slavery. Sweet Tooth is an experimental piece, using sound and movement and drawing upon archival documents from Britain and Jamaica, and taking a new look at the historical connections between the transatlantic slave trade, Caribbean sugar, and British history.

This has been a unique cross-disciplinary collaboration—bringing together the work of a historian and a group of performers to find new ways of interpreting the past. Sweet Tooth has been performed in London, Liverpool, and Southampton, as well as at the Aldeburgh Music Festival, and it was recently broadcast on BBC Radio 3.

MA History

Programme Director: Professor Chris Woolgar

This course combines training in research skills and historiography with a wide range of options, from antiquity to the late 20th century. You may wish to follow one of our themed pathways: British History, European History, Imperial History, History of the Americas. These allow you to explore a region or concept across a number of modules; however you may prefer to adopt a pick-and-mix approach and choose modules that suit your own interests.

You will be taught by leading scholars in their fields, gaining an insight into current research and making your own contribution through your dissertation.

MA Jewish History and Culture

Programme Director: Dr Claire Le Foll

Reflecting the heritage of James Parkes' scholarship, on which the Parkes Institute is founded, the programme places a distinct and unique emphasis on studying Jewish History and Culture within the broad framework of the study of Jewish/non-Jewish Relations. The course of studies builds on the world-class resources of the University's Parkes Library and Jewish Archives in the University Library, and is taught by a well-established team of scholars drawn from disciplines including history, English, German and music, brought together within the Parkes Institute.

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

Studying history can help us define a path for our future society; it helps us to discover where we came from and how our world evolved. Become an expert in your chosen field of research and explore history on a global scale. Develop your own understanding and work with specialists in this field.

Staff have strong interests in gender history, the history of identities, and the study of history and memory of migration, and offer supervision in a range of subject areas, including interdisciplinary research projects with Humanities colleagues.

Continuing your studies to masters level means you will benefit from the expertise of academics who are at the leading edge of their fields. We offer six programmes designed to allow you to pursue a single subject in depth or take a more interdisciplinary approach.

MA Applied Linguistics for Language Teaching

This MA provides an opportunity for advanced study in applied linguistics/language in education, including an element of research training. You will develop a comparative perspective on language education policy and practice, learn the skills needed to challenge professional practice, and undertake research and innovation in a range of applied language fields.

MA Applied Linguistics Research Methodology

This programme provides thorough training in research methodology if you are interested in a career as a researcher or lecturer in applied linguistics, sociolinguistics or language acquisition. It is recognised by the ESRC as the first year of a 1+3 doctoral programme, leading to a PhD award.

MA English Language Teaching TESOL

The MA English Language Teaching TESOL is a post experience programme which provides English as a Foreign Language (EFL) teachers from the UK and overseas with the opportunity to reflect on their professional experience, develop a deeper understanding of the theory and practice of English language teaching and gain the skills and competences required for leadership roles in ELT.

MA Transnational Studies

The MA in Transnational Studies offers you the opportunity to deepen your understanding of global cultures and societies, with the support of world-leading experts in a unique range of disciplines, including cultural and literary studies, history, ethnography and anthropology, and will receive thorough training in theory and research methods.

The programme welcomes graduates of all Humanities and Social Science degrees, with or without knowledge of foreign languages.

MA ELT/TESOL

This programme provides a focused route for new English language professionals who wish to develop advanced knowledge and skills in the English language curriculum, pedagogy and assessment. You will study contemporary approaches to curriculum, assessment and pedagogy, with opportunities to follow specialist interests, such as learner autonomy and English as an international language. You will develop a deeper understanding of the theory and practice of English language teaching and gain the skills required to challenge current professional practice, to innovate, and to undertake a range of leadership roles in English language teaching.

MA English Language Teaching (online)

This part-time, five-semester programme studied entirely online has been developed by the University of Southampton in collaboration with the British Council. It provides postgraduate-level study in important areas of current theory and practice in applied linguistics and language teaching and a focused route for English language teaching professionals who wish to develop advanced knowledge and skills in English language curriculum, pedagogy and assessment. Students who successfully complete the first four modules will be eligible for the PG Cert English Language Teaching (online).

You can expect a weekly commitment of 10 to 12 hours of online study, chatroom seminars and online forums, supported by 10 hours of private study.

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

This programme is suitable for students who already have an appropriate UK masters or equivalent qualification. It is a thesis-only route which has no taught courses.

The PhD route is available in all areas of modern languages research, including applied linguistics, global Englishes and transnational studies.

PhD by Distance Learning

Students who cannot relocate may study full or part time at a distance, with attendance at Southampton at key points in the programme.

Integrated PhD Applied Linguistics (English Language Teaching)

This PhD integrates structured coursework in applied linguistics and English language teaching and research skills training with the production of an original research thesis. This programme can also be studied full or part time at distance from year two onwards, once all taught modules have been completed.



MMus Music (Performance, Composition, Musicology, Music Education)

Admissions Tutor: Francesco Izzo

This intensive programme offers a comprehensive range of options and features four pathways – Musicology (including critical theory, history and analysis), Composition, Performance and Music Education (for those intending to teach music professionally) – leading to a final project, which may be a dissertation, recital or portfolio.

Each pathway offers skills training, orientation modules and individually tutored work.

MA International Music Management

How much money is generated globally by music publishing each year? Who owns the copyright in a recording? How do you get music synchronised to a video game or TV show?

This course will allow you to develop an understanding of the different roles music occupies across industries and cultures, from live performance to recorded music for streaming, advertising, video games, films and new media. You will develop a knowledge of the changing social, legal and economic frameworks within which music industries operate, the marketing, accounting and associated technology platforms that enable them, and the various career paths available in music management

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

We offer excellent research facilities and expert supervision in a wide variety of subjects. Staff expertise is among the broadest in the country, ranging from medieval music to the 21st century. We have specialists in areas including historical musicology, theory and analysis, music technology, opera studies, cultural policy, music in popular culture, ethnomusicology, and music and gender.

Another major focus is the study and practice of performance, where you may submit recital or other performance work as part of your thesis. Composition is another particular strength, and we offer supervision in a variety of idioms (classical, jazz, pop music for film and theatre).



Southampton is the UK's leading research centre for the philosophy and ethics of pregnancy and early motherhood. Dr Elselijn Kingma and Dr Fiona Woollard have been awarded numerous grants for their work in the area, including €1.2 million from the EU for a project on the Metaphysics of Pregnancy. Dr Kingma is advising the Dutch Government, professional organisations and legal charities on how to safeguard the rights of women and ethically organise maternity services. Dr Woollard is working with midwives, parental support organisations and parents to develop ways to support and encourage breastfeeding without increasing pressure on new mothers. Collectively, their research has the potential to influence millions new mothers and their babies, in the UK, the Netherlands, and beyond.

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

The PhD gives you the opportunity to pursue a substantial, independent research project supervised by one of the leading lights in the field.

With a graduate community of around 30 students, you will be part of an exciting and vibrant research culture. In addition to one-to-one supervisions, you will have the opportunity to present your work at the weekly postgraduate research seminar, led by a member of the Philosophy department. You will also benefit from other exciting events, such as visiting speaker seminars, workshops, conferences and masterclasses. In recent years we have held grants on a variety of topics, most notably an over €1.2 million ERC grant on the metaphysics of persons, pregnancy and motherhood, as well as grants on repeatable artworks, Nietzsche, the nature of normativity, and more. We have hosted numerous major conferences, such as the British Society for Ethical theory annual conference, the British Postgraduate Philosophical Association annual conference, and the British Society for Aesthetics graduate conference. Students are encouraged to take part in the wider research community of the department.
